
## Parish Life Respectfully submitted by Scott Hogan, Vestry Liaison for Parish Life

#### **Reach Ministries**

Reach is ECA's Outreach and Inreach group. We look for ways to care for parishioners who may have needs, as well as serving both ongoing and urgent needs in the community. We meet at noon on the second Sunday of each month. The committee is co-chaired by Cindy Lippert and Jane Sanders, and the Vestry liaison is Nicole File.

Reach had a very active 2022 year, expanding on some missions and beginning another significant project. We continued our partnership serving homeless neighbors with Shady Grove Baptist Church. We now serve hot dinners once a month to about 2-3 dozen people who live primarily in the wooded areas near I-75 and the Canton Rd. Connector. Guests have told us that they enjoy the fact that we bring food that is different and better quality from what they usually get. They also enjoy spending time with us, and have said that we are one of the few groups who will sit down with them and get to know them, and recognize them on future visits. We feel this is an essential part of our ministry both to them and internally.







We also have expanded our Shady Grove ministry to include takeaway breakfast bags, so people can also have something to eat in the mornings. On occasion, we have included new socks, toiletries, bug spray, and other highly sought-after items. We also passed out sleeping mats through our partnership with Softer Streets. ECA's



young people have started to get involved too. For our Thanksgiving-week meal, young kids decorated the breakfast bags, and older youth helped assemble and serve meals. We have also had non-ECA members contribute or volunteer, with a Brownie troop making 40 gift bags for our December dinner. We feel the inclusion of youth expands the ministry even further, giving our young people real-world, close-up understanding of the people we are serving and allowing them a safe way to interact with people they may not normally come into contact with in their day-to-day lives.

In other food news, our October food drive in honor of Kathy Norris was again a success, with more than 1,800 food items collected. Unfortunately, Ameris Bank has partnered

with a larger organization, and did not give us a monetary donation this year based on the amount of food we collected. Nevertheless, Papa's Pantry and Never Alone continue to be blessed by our relationship.

Our big new project this year was sponsoring a refugee family from Ukraine for humanitarian purposes. This allowed them to come to the United States for a period of at least 2 years. Nicole File became the official State



parishioners was spectacular to witness.



Department sponsor on behalf of ECA for the family. The church approved the expenditure of up to \$35,000 over a two-year period to support the family's transition. Reach helped them secure a lease on a house nearby, and paid for a



large security deposit and six months' rent up front, due to the fact that they had no U.S. credit history or income when they arrived.

Members of the parish and the community donated, delivered, and set up an entire 3-bedroom house full of furniture, small appliances, housewares, food, and other essential items as well as a closet full of clothes and numerous toys and school supplies for the family. The involvement and dedication of so many

We formed an executive subcommittee to make sure all needs are met without overburdening anyone.

Transportation, supplies, education, job hunting, paperwork for various benefits, and more are all being addressed by our members as well as a refugee resettlement agency in Atlanta. Others in the community have also rallied, with Heritage Presbyterian Church donating a huge stash of Christmas gifts, a nearby Ukrainian church offering any assistance or social opportunities they would like, and the family's old friends in Gainesville who take them to church there and back every Sunday. We also helped the family apply for and secure benefits including Medicaid and SNAP (food stamp) benefits.

Robin Racoff continued her caregiver support group for those who are providing support for elderly or ill people. A few people meet by Zoom each month to share stories and support, as well as ideas and information for maximizing resources. Robin also arranged for ECA to help pay for an adapted driving van for one of her patients, who suffers from ALS.

Our yard sale this year raised about \$3,000. We followed last year's formula of not pricing items in advance and again asked people to make an offer on whatever they selected. This greatly reduced the work and stress involved in preparations and did not impact our bottom line. We also benefited greatly from Father Paul's position as executor of a family friend's estate. After the estate sale, we received many beautiful items such as fine china, crystal, craft supplies, etc. As usual, everyone had a great time volunteering, shopping, cooking, and eating at the yard sale.



For Thanksgiving and Christmas, we took part in our annual support of Emmaus House, serving at the Grandparents' Dinner and again on Christmas weekend, including delivering toys. This was in addition to a new event we did with Emmaus House, a cookout to honor summer school students and their parents at the end of the session. We also continued our Annual Angel Tree and Thanksgiving Dinner Ministries,

helping numerous families pay for holiday meals and get Christmas gifts for their families.



The year wrapped up with a significant honor for ECA, when the Diocese of Atlanta awarded Nicole File the Bishop's Cross for her outreach work. We all look forward to continuing our efforts in 2023, sharing Christ's love with those who need it most.







#### Faith & Spirituality Respectfully Submitted by Robin Keith, Vestry Liaison to Faith & Spirituality

The year 2022 has provided the Faith & Spirituality Ministry with wonderful opportunities to come together again as a church. After the challenges we all faced the past 2 years amidst a global pandemic, it was important for us to come together, share our stories and engage in discussions about our faith and spirituality. It's more than just coming to church on Sundays; it's about spending time together, praying for each other, and building relationships so that we can share more about ourselves and recognize the great gifts God provides us every day. At ECA, there are several ways to do just that, and explore your faith and spirituality along the way.



In 2022, we continued to offer options for Christian Education. For those adults looking for a more laid-back setting, we offered a weekly class in between our 8:30am and 10:30am services lead by Ron Allen where we discussed events in our community and around the world, and how we as Christians respond to that. These

types of discussions open our minds and hearts as we hear each other's perspectives and experiences in life. It's an amazing opportunity to learn from each other. For a more formal Christian Education experience, Katie Dunlap continued to lead Education for Ministry (EFM), which offers a four-year learning certificate in theological education. The course is taught within a small group consisting of participants at various stages of the four-year program and is offered at noon on Sundays.

Another opportunity initiated in fall of 2022 was the Bible Challenge. This was a challenge Bliss Petersen decided to take on and she invited anyone else who wanted to accept the challenge to join her. The goal of the challenge is to read the entire bible in one year, with reflections along the way. The Bible Challenge group continues to meet on Sunday in-between services to share about their experiences in the previous week's readings. Anyone can join at any time.

Our newest program in 2022 was Faith, Food and Fellowship, which is a monthly dinner for people to gather, eat and share in fellowship. Faith, Food, and Fellowship meets the 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday of each month at 6:30pm. Each month had a different food theme including a taco bar, Italian night, Greek fest, and Cheeseburger in Paradise. Along with delicious food, and amazing people, we played games or offered an activity to encourage people



to get know each other better. These activities ranged from conversation starters to Jesus BINGO to contributing to the "Prayers and Thanksgivings" jar. But really, just having the opportunity to share a meal with someone you may not have much time to talk to during coffee hour, or someone who attends the opposite service as you. What a blessing! It goes back to building relationships so we can really know each other and support each as we journey through life. Our dinners will resume the third Wednesday in January 2023. All are Welcome!

The Children and Youth Ministry consists of both Christian Formation (Sunday School) and Youth Group. The ECA Youth Group is for kids  $5^{th}$  grade and up. Junior EYC is for youth  $6^{th} - 8^{th}$  grades. Senior EYC is for youth  $9^{th}$ - $12^{th}$  grades. Children

and Youth Christian Formation (Sunday School) began meeting again this year on the first Sunday of each month. This ministry worked hard in 2022 to provide opportunities for families with children to reengage with church after several years of limited activities to due to Covid.



In September we held our annual Sunday Sundae Ice Cream Social to kick of youth activities. The following week, Sunday school resumed meeting the first Sunday of

the month for all children  $Pre-K-8^{th}$  grade. Typical attendance is 2-4 children. We look forward to continuing Sunday school the first weekend of the month through the rest of the school year.

The older youth of the Parish were invited to meet in September to discuss how they want to be involved in youth group moving forward. Many expressed a desire to be involved in community service projects. Through the Group Me app, the older youth and their parents are informed of service opportunities on a monthly basis.

This year's Christmas Pageant included 10 youth participants, two years old to middle school aged, who dressed up and read the story of Jesus's birth.



As participation and engagement increase, we hope to provide more opportunities for our youth to worship and fellowship together. Feel free to reach out to Molly Norman to learn more or talk about how you can get involved!

#### Servant Ministries Respectfully Submitted by Calvin Beck, Vestry Liaison for Servant Ministries

Servant Ministries is an umbrella for the following groups: Journeys, Caregivers, Daughter of the King, Cards from the Heart, Meal Preppers, Holly Haulers and Eucharistic Ministers. Together, this ministry ensures that the members of ECA are well cared for as we serve one another in the Lord. The year 2022 presented us with many opportunities to serve one another. Below you will find a list of each ministry, their purpose and information on how to get involved.

- <u>Journeys</u>, is a support group that helps parishioners deal with life events, death, grief, depression and conflict. The Journeys ministry is mentored by Suzie Hart, a professional Social Worker and Journeys meets the second Saturday every month. This year we have had an average of four attendees per meeting.
- <u>Caregivers</u> ministry is a resource that provides to parishioners information from experience, on dealing with the care of family and friends. The Caregivers Ministry is led by Robin Racoff, a professional Caregiver support representative. This ministry meets via a Zoom conference call the second Tuesday, every month, at 7:30 p.m. This year we have had an average of two attendees per meeting.
- The <u>Daughters of the King</u> (DOK) is a service ministry that provides food at Receptions and support for families, which have experienced a death. This ministry is just beginning to refocus from the pandemic impact. The DOK will begin to meet regularly in January, date and times to be decided.
- The <u>Cards from the Heart</u> ministry is the ministry responsible for sending well wishes from ECA, by way of Birthday and Anniversary cards to the ECA parishioners. Currently, Jan Thurman and Jane Sanders are supporting this kind effort. To date, 227 birthday cards have been mailed and 53 anniversary cards.
- The <u>Meal Preppers</u> ministry provides meals to parishioners during times of difficulties or illness, on a as needed basis. Thanks to Brenda Pinkston, Megan Miller and others for preparing and delivering these meals to our ECA friends, in need.
- <u>Holly Haulers</u> is the transportation ministry, giving help where possible to the parishioners that need assistance. Currently, we have 14 people on the ECA communication tree, to help with rides to and from church, doctors' appointments and shopping needs.
- <u>Eucharistic Ministries</u> are the volunteers that assist the Rector during both the Sunday services. Currently we have approximately 12 volunteers, doing the Services but need additional volunteers.

Servant Ministries has stabilized and grown in 2022 since recovering from the pandemic. The ECA Caregivers group has set up a zoom conference call for parishioners. Journeys has a backup mentor, so that meetings can always occur. The Cards from the Heart has expanded to two people. The Holy Haulers are meeting more transportation needs. Together we continue to grow and improve the life and love of others here at ECA!

### Worship Ministry Respectfully submitted by Foster Peterson, Vestry Liaison to Worship

Worship in 2022 continued in person with regular and wonderful contributions from our altar guild, service volunteers, the choir, and our pianist, Joe Lozier. The Worship Committee resumed meeting to help Fr. Paul plan worship services. Highlights of the year include:

#### Altar Guild

The Altar Guild is led by Bliss Peterson and Brenda Pinkston and consists of 4 teams who handle the work of preparing the church for worship. They welcomed Carolyn Gay and Ann Rudy to their ranks in 2022 and held an in-person training/fellowship day on June 13, which included a session on flower arrangement. As a larger project, the Altar Guild is interested in refreshing (cleaning/painting/re-organizing) the sacristy.

#### Choir / Music

We continue to be blessed with Joe Lozier as our pianist and choirmaster. The choir practices on Thursday evenings at 7:15 pm. The size on Sundays fluctuates somewhat but there are currently 11 members! Our beautiful (both looking and sounding!) grand piano was dedicated on Palm Sunday. There were multiple music offerings during the Holy Week/Easter services including Bliss Peterson singing the Exsultet at the Easter Vigil. On Easter Day, we were introduced to 2 new trumpet players at the 9 and 10:45 am services in addition to Scott Lozier on violin, and Chris Norman (mandolin) sang "Because He Lives" with accompaniment from Joe Lozier (piano) and Foster Peterson (acoustic guitar). The choir prepared and performed several special pieces for the 9 pm Christmas Eve Service, and were joined by guest musicians Scott Lozier (violin), Emily Laminack Wetzel (violin), Charles Laux (cello), and David Wetzel (trumpet).

#### Worship Services

We continue with 8:30 and 10:30 am services on Sundays. Many thanks to Horace Higgins who live-streams the 8:30 service on our Facebook page. We returned to the full complement of Holy Week and Easter services and the choir returned to processing in/out on Palm Sunday.

We held a special service on October 15 to celebrate 3 wonderful happenings: Fr. Paul and Katie's marriage, paying off our debt, and a visit from Bishop Rob Wright. We had a packed church (176 people for the service itself) and a full complement of volunteers for this wonderful service.

We held 3 services on Christmas Eve: the Traditional Children's Christmas Pageant at 5 pm followed by Traditional Carols & Holy Eucharist Rite II Service at 7 pm and the Festive Carols & Traditional Rite II Candlelight Service at 9 pm.

We have been more successful as we get further from the pandemic in finding supply clergy for the Sundays where Fr. Paul is away. Supply clergy this year included The Rev. Rebecca Roberts from St. Catherine's, Marietta and Fr. Roger Allen and Fr. Daron Vroon from St. James, Marietta. Foster Peterson conducted Morning Prayer on the Sundays where we did not have a supply priest.

A new form (that is placed on the lectern) was developed to help standardize how the lectors introduce the readings and psalm.

#### Worship Volunteers

The 8:30 and 10:30 services have a small number of regular volunteers in the service volunteer positions (Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, Ushers, Acolytes (youth and adult), Intercessors, and Vergers). Announcements continue to be made in ECA News, bulletin, and in church for service volunteers. Training for new and returning volunteers has been handled by Foster Peterson and Fr. Paul on an individual basis thus far. Will look to do a larger in-person day for those interested in 2023. Please consider giving of your talents to volunteer in our corporate worship.
